Gifts for the King: What Should You Bring?

LAST WEEK'S MESSAGE

In the Christmas story, the magi journeyed 2,175 kilometers from the east (Persia) to worship the baby Jesus in Bethlehem (Matthew 2:11). They brought gifts: gold (representing kingship), frankincense (representing divinity), and myrrh (used for burial), all symbolizing key aspects of Jesus' life and persona.

Our journey as Christ-followers is about being conformed and transformed into Christlikeness (Romans 8:29) — therefore what gifts fit for a King should we bring?

HUMILITY IS GOLDEN

As we read through the birth of Jesus in Luke 2:8-9, we see a connection between humility and obedience. Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John narrate this event from different perspectives for different audiences (Luke 1:3), and from them we learn that some shepherds were the first to hear about the birth of Christ through an angel.

The magi and the shepherds are two very different groups of people. Unlike the magi who had expensive gifts for Jesus, these lowly shepherds had nothing to offer except their adoration, praise, and testimony about Jesus (Luke 2:15-18). They were transformed by their experience that they became witnesses for Jesus, glorifying and praising God (Luke 2:20). When we are transformed as believers in Christ, we must respond by sharing Christ to others. When we faithfully serve Jesus and witness for Him, that is worship and it is golden to Him. God says that the least is the greatest among us (1 Corinthians 12:22-23).

Another example of humility was Zechariah (Luke 1:5-21). An angel told Zechariah that his wife Elizabeth would bear him a son, but he doubted it and consequently became mute. When their son was born, he was able to speak again and sang a song of praise (Luke 1:67-79) while Elizabeth broke out in song because of what God has done (Luke 1:5-7). Their son was John the Baptist, who was also a humble man who acknowledged that Jesus was greater than him (Mark 1:6-7).

"The Magnificat" is Mary's humble response to God as His "bondslave" and as someone who needs a Savior. After receiving the message from the angel Gabriel about

the Savior being born through her, Mary visited Elizabeth during her pregnancy (Luke 1:26-38). Even as an unborn baby, John was already exalting Jesus (Luke 1:39-44)! What a profound thing it is to know that even without a voice, a fetus was the first to rejoice at the news of Jesus!

The greatest act of humility is to acknowledge that we need a Savior because we all have sinned (Luke 1:46-48). None of us can earn credits or merits to save ourselves — we need Jesus to save us!

GRATITUDE IS WORSHIP

Righteous and devout, Simeon was the next character to burst out in song after he saw Jesus, the long-awaited "consolation of Israel" (Luke 2:25-33). The prophetess Anna broke out in song upon meeting Him (Luke 2:36-38). Praising and singing is worship, that's why we have the Book of Psalms! For God, our gratitude is worship and thanksgiving.

OBEDIENCE IS SACRIFICE

In his gospel, Matthew recounts Abraham, who obeyed God right away to offer his son Isaac as a sacrifice, and Joseph, who obeyed God's command (Matthew 1:19-25, 2:13-14). Joseph even continued to obey God later in his life when he took his family back to Israel from Egypt after Herod had died (Matthew 2:19-21).

What about us? What obedience is required of us? God sent Jesus Christ to save us from our sins. We need to realize that the good gifts and knowledge we have about God are nothing if we do not love the people around us and reconcile them to God through Christ (1 Corinthians 13:1-3, 2 Corinthians 5:17-20). People will perish in the "lake of fire" if they are not in Jesus, our only Savior. There is an urgency to share Jesus with everyone before it is too late.

The Old Testament pointed to Jesus — the clock to the end times began ticking once He was born, thus, we are now living in those days (Hebrews 1:1-2). This Christmas, let us offer the gift of humility, gratitude, and obedience to Jesus. Let's bring others to Jesus, by reminding them to repent and humbly come to Christ (2 Timothy 4:1-2, Luke 15:10).
